Algeria's Shield in the Fight Against Corruption

A COMPREHENSIVE STRATEGY TO EMBED INTEGRITY,
TRANSPARENCY, AND GOOD GOVERNANCE

The High Authority for Transparency, Prevention and fight against Corruption has emerged as one of the most important achievements of the constitutional reforms introduced by the 2020 Constitution. It transformed from a limited advisory body into a constitutional oversight institution playing a central role in strengthening integrity and promoting ethical public life.

The President of the Authority, Professor Salima Mesrati, affirms that the creation of this institution is based on “an international dimension that reflects Algeria’s respect for its commitments under the United Nations

Convention against Corruption, and a national constitutional dimension that expresses the state’s desire to strengthen integrity and transparency.” This new positioning granted the Authority real oversight powers and enabled the establishment of a more rigorous institutional framework to combat corruption in line with international standards.

The shift reflects a clear political will to build an effective system for ethical public life through modernizing laws, developing monitoring mechanisms, and launching the national strategy for transparency, prevention, and combating corruption—now the primary reference framework for good governance in Algeria.



GENUINE POLITICAL WILL TO STRENGTHEN INTEGRITY

Algeria's efforts in combating corruption reflect a genuine political will expressed by the President of the Republic, Mr. Abdelmadjid Tebboune, since 2019 through his electoral program, which placed ethical public life and the fight against corruption among its top priorities. This political will materialized in a series of major reforms, starting with the 2020 constitutional amendment that strengthened the role of oversight institutions such as the Constitutional Court and the High Authority for Transparency. Deep legal reforms followed, including the adoption of advanced laws such as Law 08-22 of May 5, 2022 governing the High Authority, along with the Investment Law, amendments to the law on money laundering and organized crime, and revisions to the Code of Criminal Procedure.

EXTENSIVE POWERS GRANTED TO THE HIGH AUTHORITY

The law entrusted the High Authority with a wide range of powers placing it at the heart of the national anti-corruption system. These include preparing and implementing the national strategy for transparency, prevention, and combating corruption; strengthening integrity among high-ranking officials and elected repre-

sentatives through the asset declaration system; conducting training and awareness programs for public officials and civil society; evaluating legal mechanisms related to anti-corruption; and processing cases of illicit enrichment through specialized departments.

The Authority also works alongside other institutions—such as the Central Office for the Repression of Corruption, financial intelligence units, and the judiciary—within an integrated national framework.

THE NATIONAL TRANSPARENCY STRATEGY : A COMPREHENSIVE VISION

Since the establishment of the Authority and the appointment of its President, Professor Salima Mesrati, efforts began to prepare the national strategy for transparency, prevention, and combating corruption, considered the most important reference framework. After ratifying the UN Convention against Corruption in 2004, Algeria committed to developing a national strategy as stipulated in Article 5 of the Convention.

Launched on July 17, 2023 under the High Patronage of the President of the Republic, the strategy resulted from an integrated, participatory methodology involving national and international meetings with ministerial departments, constitutional institutions, experts, academics, the media, and civil society organizations.

This participatory approach is based on an accurate diagnosis of corruption realities and on identifying future measures while drawing on international experiences. The strategy includes performance indicators to monitor progress and achieve clear goals: ethical public life, integrity and accountability in managing public funds, transparency in the public and private sectors, and enhancing Algeria's international standing.

THE NATIONAL STRATEGY OBJECTIVES

The strategy comprises five major pillars (2023–2027), from which 17 strategic objectives and 60 measures were derived. Its pillars include:



ethical public life; strengthening the role of civil society and media in corruption prevention; promoting integrity and transparency in the economic sector; enhancing the capacities of law enforcement authorities and the judiciary; and reinforcing international cooperation and asset recovery.

Some measures are cross-sectoral, such as codes of conduct, while others target specific sectors. All sectors were informed of their commitments for the five-year period.

A PRACTICAL STRUCTURE : FROM DECLARATION TO INVESTIGATION

The High Authority adopted a practical structure consisting of three interconnected groups. The first is the Department of Asset Declarations, Compliance, and Notifications, responsible for receiving declarations, verifying them, and ensuring their consistency with financial data.

The second group, the Department of Awareness, Training, and Cooperation, oversees awareness programs, capacity-building initiatives, and cooperation with civil society and national and international institutions.

The third group handles administrative and financial investigations, opening files in cases of suspicion and referring verified cases to judicial or oversight authorities.

PERFORMANCE MEASUREMENT INDICATORS : THE “ENAZAHA” INDEX

One of the strategy’s most notable features is the inclusion of annual evaluation indicators, the most significant being the “Enazaha” effectiveness index. Developed in coordination with the UNDP and inspired by the South Korean model—while adapted to Algeria’s legal and institutional context—the index aims to enhance transparency, integrity, and accountability within sectors.

It is built on three pillars: integrity, transparency, and accountability, with 8 criteria, 17 measurement indicators, and 58 evaluation indicators.

Participation in the index is voluntary. So far, 16 ministerial sectors, 11 general directorates, and 5 pilot municipalities (2025) have joined. It allows sectors to benefit from comparative experiences, adopt best practices, and address underperformance in cooperation with the High Authority.

FROM RECEIVING REPORTS TO VERIFICATION : A PRECISE REPORTING MECHANISM

Although some believe the High Authority’s role is limited to receiving corruption reports, reality shows a complex institutional process. The Authority not only receives reports but also processes them through strict legal procedures to ensure integrity and effective follow-up of any suspicion.

Citizens and legal entities may submit reports, provided they meet the requirements of Law 08-22—written submission and identification of the whistleblower (phone number, ID copy, or email), allowing verification if needed.

To facilitate reporting, the Authority established multiple channels: a listening unit and a reporting follow-up unit meeting every 15 days; direct deposit at post offices; fax or email submission; the electronic platform “Ballaghna” launched in 2023; and the toll-free number 1027, noting that reports must be submitted in writing for official documentation.



“NARAKOM” NETWORK : STRENGTHENING PARTNERSHIP WITH CIVIL SOCIETY

To enhance community participation in combating corruption, the Authority launched an interactive network called “Narakom”, enabling associations to actively contribute to transparency and integrity efforts. Ninety-six associations were selected as part of the executive committee, while others may participate as observers.

The network operates through a digital platform that records and tracks the activities of associations, ensuring transparency and objectivity in evaluating participation and enhancing civil society’s role as a partner in national reform.

AWARENESS AND TRAINING AT THE CORE OF THE STRATEGY

The High Authority considers awareness and training essential for fostering a culture of integrity. It launched training programs for focal points within ministries and institutions to facilitate the implementation of the national transparency strategy and the integrity index.

In a single year, the Authority organized three major training sessions focusing on key skills such as project management, corruption risk management, and codes of conduct.

It also organized 20 training sessions benefiting more than 400 trainers and local officials and processed 60 complete training files. The partnership network now includes 320 national associations, 24 university research labs, and 8 media institutions.

A Master’s program in Transparency and Anti-Corruption was launched in cooperation with the Ministry of Higher Education, benefiting more than 2,300 students since 2024, accompanied by the creation of a national research laboratory with five academic teams.

The Authority also led awareness campaigns with universities targeting students, professors, and intellectuals to promote the culture of corruption prevention.

DIGITALIZATION : A NEW WEAPON AGAINST CORRUPTION

Digital transformation has become a fundamental pillar for the High Authority in strengthening transparency and combating corruption. Estimates indicate that 50% of corruption-related problems can be reduced through digital tools that minimize human intervention in administrative procedures, reduce intermediaries, increase accountability, and simplify services.

THE 2025 DYNAMICS : NUMBERS CONFIRM THE SUCCESS OF THE NEW NATIONAL APPROACH

Official statistics show significant progress in asset declaration compliance:

- ◆ 92.63% among high-ranking officials
- ◆ 94 % among local elected representatives

At the beginning of the process, compliance did not exceed 14%, making the progress achieved between 2020 and 2025 remarkable.

In 2025, the Authority registered 1,636 notifications—19% anonymous, 81% identified. Of these, 210 cases were investigated, 36 referred to public prosecutors, and 6 to the Court of Auditors.

TOWARDS INSTILLING A NATIONAL CULTURE OF INTEGRITY

The achievements made between 2020 and 2025 form a solid foundation for building a national system of transparency and accountability. Constitutional and legal reforms, digital transformation, new measurement tools, and expanded partnerships have collectively created a clear institutional dynamic.

Professor Mesrati affirms that the High Authority will continue working to “embed the values of integrity and ethical public life” in line with the vision of the New Algeria, based on transparency, justice, and good governance.

Participation of the President of the High Authority in the End-of-Academic-Year Ceremony at Blida 2 University



At the kind invitation of Professor Kourtel Farid, Rector of Blida 2 – Lounici Ali University, Professor Salima Mesrati, President of the High Authority for Transparency, Prevention and fight against Corruption, attended the end-of-academic-year ceremony for 2024/2025 organized by the university.

Held on 15 November 2025, this ceremony provided an opportunity to honor outstanding students in the Master's and Bachelor's programs from the various faculties of the university, and this participation embodied constructive cooperation between the High Authority and academic institutions in promoting a culture of integrity and transparency.

During the ceremony, the President expressed her appreciation for this gracious invitation, emphasizing the importance of cooperation between the High Authority and universities in entrenching the values of integrity and combating corruption, and praising the efforts of Blida 2 University in graduating national talents capable of contributing to the building of tomorrow's Algeria.

She also commended the top-performing students, who represented a model of diligence and perseverance, expressing her hope that they will place their expertise and knowledge at the service of the nation and help advance the path of construction and development.





Participation of the President of the High Authority in the Conference of the National Independent Authority for Elections



On 8 July 2025, Professor Salima Mesrati, President of the High Authority for Transparency, Prevention and fight against Corruption, took part in the conference organized by the National Independent Authority for Elections under the theme “The Legal Framework of the Committee for Monitoring the Financing of the Electoral Campaign”. This conference was held in the context of the attention given by the Algerian state to the moralization of political life, the fight against corruption and the strengthening of transparency, which constitute a strategic choice of the President of the Republic, M^r. Abdelmadjid Tebboune. The event provided an important platform to discuss the legal framework governing the work of committees responsible for monitoring the financing of electoral campaigns and to review best practices in this field, offering an opportunity to exchange expertise among the various bodies and institutions concerned.

During her contribution, the President stressed the importance of strengthening transparency in the financing of electoral campaigns as one of the fundamental pillars of the fight against political corruption, and she praised the efforts made by the National Independent Authority for Elections in this regard. She also expressed the commitment of the High Authority for Transparency, Prevention and fight against Corruption to supporting all efforts aimed at consolidating the principles of integrity and transparency in political life, in line with the national strategy for transparency, prevention and fight against corruption.

Participation of the President of the High Authority in the National Summit “Youth and Political Participation”

At the invitation of M^r. Mustapha Hidaoui, President of the Higher Council for Youth, Professor Salima Mesrati, President of the High Authority for Transparency, Prevention and fight against Corruption, took part in the proceedings of the “National Summit for Youth and Political Participation”, held under the high patronage of the President of the Republic, M^r. Abdelmadjid Tebboune. The President participated in a high-level panel that served as a platform for constructive dialogue and joint reflection on ways to support and strengthen youth participation in political life, where she underlined the importance of enhancing the role of young people in promoting a culture of integrity and combating corruption.

The sessions included an assessment of current challenges, a presentation of the vision of public bodies regarding the reforms adopted to involve young people in political life, as well as a discussion of successful experiences and good practices and the proposal of practical mechanisms and solutions that respond to the aspirations of the new generation. This participation reflected alignment with the objectives of the national strategy for transparency, prevention and fight against corruption in strengthening participatory democracy, and the importance of involving youth in shaping public policies and decision-making.





Information Day on the Public Register of Beneficial Owners

At the kind invitation of the Minister of Domestic Trade and the National Market Regulation, Mr. Tayeb Zitouni, Professor Salima Mesrati, President of the High Authority for Transparency, Prevention and fight against Corruption, took part in the proceedings of the information day on the public register of beneficial owners, organized by the National Center of the Trade Register under the slogan: “The beneficial owner: a protective shield against money laundering and the financing of terrorism.”

Held on 18 November 2025, this event aimed to shed light on the crucial importance of identifying the beneficial owner as a key mechanism for strengthening transparency, ensuring sound governance of financial transactions, and

countering financial crimes, foremost among them money laundering and the financing of terrorism.

During her participation, the President stressed the central role of the public register of beneficial owners in enhancing financial transparency and combating corruption, reaffirming the commitment of the High Authority to supporting all efforts aimed at operationalizing this important mechanism.

She also commended the commendable initiative of the Ministry of Trade and the National Center of the Trade Register in organizing this information day, which forms part of national efforts to develop tools capable of combating economic and financial crime and to foster a transparent and integrity-based business environment.



Celebrating the National children's day

At the invitation of the National Commissioner for Child Protection, Mrs. Meriem Cherfi, Professor Salima Mesrati, President of the High Authority for Transparency, Prevention and fight against Corruption, attended the celebration of the National Day of the Algerian Child, observed on 15 July each year.

This year's celebration was held under the slogan "All of us for our children in a victorious Algeria" and was organized by the National Organ for the Protection and Promotion of Children in coordination with the Ministry of Youth, with the events taking place on 15 July 2025 under the theme "Ten years since the enactment of the Child Protection Law: Achievements and Challenges."

This national event provided an opportunity to assess the progress achieved

by Algeria in the field of child protection since the enactment of the Child Protection Law ten years ago, and to review the accomplishments made and the future challenges in this area.

During her participation, the President emphasized the importance of strengthening the values of integrity and transparency in all programs and strategies aimed at protecting children, stressing the need for the concerted efforts of all sectors to ensure a safe and ethical environment for Algerian children.

She also praised the national efforts made in the field of child protection, expressing the readiness of the High Authority to contribute to all initiatives aimed at consolidating a culture of integrity and protecting children's rights within its strategies for the prevention and fight against corruption.





High Authority representative meets with the Legal Affairs Committee in parliament

On 9 July 2025, the Committee on Legal and Administrative Affairs and Freedoms began examining a bill amending and supplementing Law No.

05-01 on the prevention and combating money laundering and the financing of terrorism, under the chairmanship of Mr. Hicham Safar, Chair of the Committee.

During this meeting, the Committee hosted experts and officials from institutions related to the subject, with the aim of presenting proposals that would help enrich the discussion surrounding this draft legal text.

In this context, Mr. Mohamed El Akhdari, Director General of the Central Office for the Repression of Corruption, indicated that the draft law clarifies certain aspects and establishes a balance between the obligations incumbent upon the State, on the one hand, and the various stakeholders, on the other hand, while also giving concrete substance to the assessment of political will and the proper evaluation of risks.

For his part, Mr. Si Fodhil Hanfi, Secretary-General of the Executive Banking Council at the Bank of Algeria, noted that this draft law stems from a set of conventions that Algeria

has ratified in full sovereignty, highlighting their effective role in various international decisions relating to the fight against all forms of crime and money laundering, including the criminalization of ransom payments.

He also referred to the strict measures taken by Algeria regarding the implementation of the Financial Action Task Force (FATF) action plan, through thirteen measures prepared with the contribution of various committees and sectors concerned with combating the financing of terrorism and money laundering.

Mr. Marouane Ben Rahmoun, representative of the High Authority for Transparency, Prevention and fight against Corruption, and Mr. Oudhni Mohamed, member of the Board of the Financial Intelligence Unit, presented technical observations on this draft law and highlighted some of its aspects and specific features. Before concluding, the members of the Committee raised questions and requests for clarification with a view to enriching the draft law, and the Chair, Mr. Hicham Safar, expressed his thanks and appreciation to the speakers for the range of observations and proposals around which the discussions revolved.





The High Authority Council Holds Two Ordinary Sessions

In Following the provisions of Article 31 of Law No. 08-22, the High Authority for Transparency, Prevention and Fight Against Corruption held its ordinary session on July 19, 2025, chaired by Professor Salima Mesrati, the President of the Authority. The meeting was attended by all Council members and focused on key areas, including reviewing notifications received by the Authority in the first half of 2025 and discussing files previously referred to regional prosecutors. The Council examined 19 cases of suspected corruption, reviewed measures taken, and approved the Authority's 2024 annual report. This meeting reflects the Authority's ongoing efforts to monitor and evaluate its activities, implement its anti-corruption strat-



egy, and promote transparency and integrity. A subsequent meeting took place on October 21, 2025, where the Council reviewed the Authority's internal regulations, examined notifications, and discussed suspected corruption cases. These meetings demonstrate the Authority's commitment to its mandate, promoting good governance, and combating corruption.

Commemoration of the 64th Anniversary of the National Day of Migration

The Supreme Authority for Transparency, Prevention, and the Fight against Corruption commemorated the 64th anniversary of the National Day of Migration, marking the memory of the martyrs of the October 17, 1961 events, in implementation of the decision of His Excellency the President of the Republic, Mr. Abdelmadjid Tebboune, to commemorate the national anniversary of migration. During this historic commemoration, the Supreme Authority observed a minute of silence in tribute to the noble martyrs, honoring the immense sacrifices made by Algerian migrants in the struggle for the

country's liberation and the defense of its sovereignty. This event was an opportunity to renew the commitment to the spirit of the martyrs and to reaffirm the continuation of the path of construction and development for which they gave their lives, reflecting the values of national unity and dedication to the principles of the glorious Liberation Revolution. On this occasion, the Supreme Authority for Transparency, Prevention, and the Fight against Corruption reaffirmed its commitment to the values of the nation and its full readiness to continue its efforts and dedication in honor of the blood of the martyrs shed for Algeria's freedom and dignity.



The High Authority Emphasizes Coordination to fight Money Laundering and Terrorist Financing

At the invitation of the Chair of the Commission for the Organization and Supervision of Stock Exchange Operations, M^r. Youssef Bouzanada, the President of the High Authority for Transparency and the Prevention and Fight against Corruption, Professor Salima Mesrati, took part in the proceedings of the seminar organized by the Commission at the Ministry of Finance. The seminar was devoted to presenting the results of the sectoral risk assessment report on money laundering and terrorist financing in the securities sector. This seminar formed part of the implementation of the recommendations of the Financial Action Task Force (GAFI), which call for the dissemination of sectoral assessment results and the strengthening of awareness and outreach efforts among supervised entities, in order to support the national system for combating money laundering and terrorist financing and to promote

transparency in financial transactions.

The proceedings were marked by broad participation from representatives of regulatory and financial bodies and relevant national institutions, making the event an opportunity to exchange views and expertise on best practices for strengthening early warning mechanisms and reinforcing institutional capacities to address challenges linked to financial crime.

M^r. Ben Rahmoun Marouane, representing the High Authority, also took part in the panel discussion held during the seminar. In his intervention, he underlined the importance of complementarity and coordination among national bodies in tackling money laundering and terrorist financing, stressing the central role of transparency as a preventive and deterrent tool.

The seminar concluded with a set of key recommendations, including:

- ◆ Strengthening institutional coordination among national stakeholders to address

She also affirmed the Authority's full readiness to support all efforts aimed at strengthening the independence of the judiciary and entrenching a culture of integrity within the judicial system.

- ◆ Developing oversight and early warning mechanisms in the securities sector by modernizing technical tools and enhancing human capacities.
- ◆ Intensifying awareness and outreach campaigns for supervised entities in order to entrench a culture of compliance and transparency.
- ◆ Working to integrate the results of sectoral assessments into national policies so as to ensure an effective response to identified risks.

These recommendations reflect a shared national commitment to reinforcing the Algerian framework for addressing contemporary financial challenges and to consolidating Algeria's position among states that seek to entrench transparency and protect the national economy from financial crime risks.

Coordination Meeting for the Celebration of the International Anti-Corruption Day

A coordination meeting was held on November 3, 2025, between the Supreme Authority for Transparency, Prevention, and Fight against Corruption and the University of Oran 2 Mohamed Ben Ahmed, to prepare for the celebration of the International Anti-Corruption Day on December 9.

The meeting was attended by Professor Ahmed Chaâlal, Rector of the University, along with a number of senior university staff, and a delegation from the High Authority that included Ms. Yakout Aissani and Mr. Bachir Yelles Chaouch, both members of the Authority's Council, in addition to several specialized staff.

The meeting was devoted to setting the organizational and academic aspects of the events commemorating the International Anti-Corruption Day, which will be hosted this year by the province of Oran, and participants discussed the detailed programme of the activities and accompanying events. The encounter also provided an opportunity to define the roles and responsibilities of each party to ensure the success of this important national event, which aims to promote a culture of integrity and transparency and to raise public awareness of the risks of corruption and the importance of combating it, within the framework of a strategic partnership between the High Authority and academic institutions.



Coordination Meeting with the Ministry of National Solidarity to Implement the "Enazaha" Indicator

A coordination meeting was held on November 10, 2025, at the headquarters of the Supreme Authority for Transparency, Prevention and Fight against Corruption, bringing together officials from the Supreme Authority and their counterparts from the Ministry of National Solidarity, Family and Women's Affairs.

The discussion focused on ways and means to implement the "Enazaha" effectiveness indicator at the level of the National Solidarity sector, and reviewed the progress made in implementing the national strategy's axes and measures, particularly those related to enhancing transparency in the management of social programs.

The two parties discussed the practical steps to generalize integrity measurement tools and consolidate a culture of corruption prevention in administrative and social practices. They emphasized the importance of joint work between public bodies to achieve the objectives set out in the national strategy.

The meeting provided an opportunity to evaluate the previous stages of joint cooperation and identify mechanisms to continue field coordination between the two parties, with a view to achieving common goals in the field of promoting transparency and the fight against corruption.

and Fight against Corruption, a coordination meeting was held today, 20 November 2025, at the headquarters of the High Authority with members of the office of the Algerian Transparency Network “Narakom”, in the presence of senior staff of the High Authority, following the completion by members of the Network’s committee sessions recently organized in Mostaganem and Bouira. The meeting provided an opportunity for network members to present various concerns and challenges faced by the network in carrying out its tasks, as well as discussing effective

ways to enhance its capacities and strengthen its field presence, in line with the Supreme Authority’s vision of involving civil society as a key player in the integrity system.

The meeting also agreed on launching the preparation of an annual program for the network’s work, including awareness-raising and training initiatives and follow-up mechanisms, to be submitted for approval by the end of 2025, allowing the Supreme Authority to organize the network’s work and consolidate its role in supporting transparency and strengthening social control, implementing the second objective of the national strategy, which calls for encouraging the participation of civil society and the media in fighting corruption.

Algeria’s participation in international events

As part of the work of the multi-sectoral committee chaired by the High Authority, responsible for monitoring Algeria’s participation in international sessions and conferences and for implementing international and regional conventions in the field of preventing and combating corruption, a coordination meeting of the committee was held on the evening of Wednesday, 26 November 2025, chaired by the President of the

of the United Nations Office on Drugs and Crime, as well as on preparing the participation of the Algerian delegation in the 11th session of the Conference of the States Parties to the United Nations Convention against Corruption, scheduled to be held in Doha.

Samir Bourahil, President of the National Authority for the Protection of Personal Data, Professor Salima Mesrati, President of the High Authority for Transparency and for the Prevention and Fight against Corruption, took part today in the proceedings of the National Study Day held at the El Aurassi Hotel, under the title: “Compliance with the Provisions of Law 18 07... Challenges of Personal Data Protection in the Era of Digital Transformation, Cybersecurity and Artificial Intelligence”.

The event was attended by the President of the Council of the Nation, the President of the

People’s National Assembly, members of the government, as well as presidents and representatives of a number of constitutional and consultative bodies and senior state officials.





New regulatory text to strengthen the accountability and good governance

Professor Salima Mesrati, President of the High Authority for Transparency, Prevention and Fight against Corruption, alongside Mr. Sid Ali Zerouki, Minister of Post and Telecommunications, November 30, 2025, supervised the opening of the study day dedicated to the topic: “Prevention of Corruption Crimes in Public Economic Institutions,” in the presence of members of the High Authority’s Council and its staff, as well as officials and directors of institutions under the sector. In her opening speech, the President of the High Authority emphasized the importance of strengthening the integrity of public officials, highlighting the role of the National Strategy for Transparency, Prevention, and Fight against Corruption through its third objective, which promotes transparency and competitiveness in the business environment, as well as enhancing integrity within economic institutions. The President of the High Authority also highlighted that public economic institu-

tions will soon be required to implement effective transparency systems in accordance with Law 22-08, once the implementing regulation is issued, aiming to strengthen accountability and consolidate good governance. She also confirmed that the High Authority intends to expand the list of public officials required to declare their assets, particularly managers of institutions with large budgets. She concluded by affirming that digitalization has become a fundamental pillar for establishing transparency and integrity within institutions, and that the High Authority will continue to support institutions in consolidating the principles of good governance. In the context of institutional cooperation, a framework agreement was signed between the High Authority and the Ministry, which will contribute to enhancing the capacities of public officials in the field of corruption prevention, support the preparation of a sectoral map of corruption risks at institutions under the Ministry, and develop effective plans to combat it.



Meeting to monitor the implementation of the National Transparency Strategy”



On Wednesday, December 3, 2025, Professor Salima Mesrati, Chairperson of the High Authority for Transparency, Prevention, and the Fight Against Corruption, presided over a meeting of the National Committee for Monitoring the Implementation of the National Strategy for Transparency, Prevention, and the Fight Against Corruption at the Authority’s headquarters, in the presence of representatives from sovereign institutions and entities that are members of the committee.

The meeting was held as part of the monitoring and evaluation of the strategy’s implementation throughout 2024. A detailed presentation was delivered on the progress achieved across various measures, highlighting differences in the pace of implementation between sectors, as well as examining the challenges and obstacles that hindered the execution of certain measures and caused delays. The meeting provided an opportunity to redirect the evaluation process by proposing practical mechanisms to enhance the effectiveness of monitoring, and to strengthen institutional com-

munication with the sectors, ensuring the acceleration of implementation and the recovery of delays recorded in several projects scheduled for 2024 and 2025.

The meeting also concluded with a set of practical recommendations, notably the reinforcement of periodic monitoring mechanisms, the continuation of training efforts, the intensification of digitalization of procedures, as well as the provisions of the third objective of the strategy regarding the enhancement of transparency and integrity in the economic sector. This includes encouraging the engagement of both public and private sectors in promoting integrity and transparency principles and supporting the role of civil society organizations in prevention and anti-corruption efforts.

In the next phase, focus will be placed on the widespread adoption of the Code of Ethics, the organization of specialized integrity training, the introduction of new training courses, and the continuation of awareness and training programs targeting youth. Through this meeting, the Chairperson reaffirmed her unwavering commitment to continue and intensify efforts to achieve a strategic vision based on the principles of integrity, transparency, and accountability, thereby strengthening anti-corruption measures and ensuring the sustainability of good governance.

“Forum between the Ministry of Justice and the Russian Prosecutor General’s Office”

At the invitation of the Ministry of Justice, Mr. Mohamed Jelaoui, member of the High Authority for Transparency, Prevention, and the Fight Against Corruption, accompanied by Mr. Hazil Haroun, an official from the Authority, participated on December 14 and 15, 2025, in the forum organized within the



framework of cooperation between the Ministry of Justice and the Prosecutor General’s Office of the Russian Federation. The forum focused on two main topics: “Prevention and Fight Against Corruption and the Recovery of Illegally Transferred Assets Abroad” and “Combating Environmental Crime.” On this occasion, the representative of the High Authority delivered a presentation entitled “Mandate and Role of the High Authority for Transparency, Prevention, and the Fight Against Corruption,” in which he reviewed the legal and institutional framework of the Authority’s work and its efforts to promote transparency and combat corruption.



Signing of an Agreement and Intensive Activity During a Study Day in Oran

Under the high patronage of the President of the Republic, Abdelmadjid Tebboune, Professor Salima Massrati, President of the High Authority for Transparency, Prevention and Fight Against Corruption, supervised on 9 December 2025, together with the Wali of Oran, Ibrahim Oushan, and in the presence of the President of Oran 2 University, Professor Ahmed Chaâlal, the proceedings of a study day entitled “Digital Governance as a Tool for Preventing Corruption for Sustainable Transparency,” organized by the High Authority in cooperation with Oran 2 University Mohamed Ben Ahmed.

The study day was attended by many sectors and institutions, as well as guests of honor, including a representative of the Presidency of the Republic, the First Delegate of the Egyptian Administrative Control Authority, the Inspector General of the Ministry of the Interior, Local Authorities

and Transport, the Director General of the Higher School of the Judiciary representing the Minister of Justice, a representative of the President of the Council of the Nation, a representative of the President of the People’s National Assembly, the Inspector General of the Ministry of Higher Education and Scientific Research, the National Committee for Monitoring the Implementation of the Strategy, members of the High Authority and its senior staff, members of the Algerian Transparency Network “Narakom,” civil and military authorities, professors, and students of the Faculty of Law and Political Science.

In her opening remarks, Professor Massrati affirmed that this study day represents a valuable opportunity to exchange views and present experiences to improve service quality and reject corruption in public and private administrations, considering the fight against corruption a national duty. She stressed that combating corruption is



not a temporary responsibility nor an isolated technical task, but a deep reform process that requires the involvement of youth, all societal actors, coherent institutional cooperation, and increasing reliance on technology and innovation. The study day, organized by the High Authority

in cooperation with Oran 2 University, witnessed the signing of a cooperation protocol between the Ministry of Justice and the High Authority for Transparency, Prevention and Fight Against Corruption.

The agreement aims to establish an operational framework to promote and strengthen joint work between the High Authority and the Ministry of Justice by organizing and developing mechanisms for exchanging information related to reports and notifications received by the High Authority concerning acts suspected of corruption, while ensuring access to information regarding the procedures taken by the competent judicial authorities. The agreement covers the sending and monitoring of the status of corruption-related reports and notifications through a modern information system that ensures direct and secure connection between the High Authority and the territorially competent public prosecutors. It strengthens the effectiveness of processing by enabling precise tracking of notifications from the moment they are submitted until received by the relevant judicial authority, in addition to enhancing digital cooperation to accelerate procedures and uphold the principle of transparency in handling corruption cases.



The release of new postage stamp

On the sidelines of the study day, the President of the High Authority, Professor Salima Massrati, supervised the unveiling of a special postage stamp dedicated to commemorating the International Anti-Corruption Day. The ceremony included the lifting of the cover and the placement of the first stamp mark. This issuance reflects the commitment of the Algerian state and the High Authority to promoting the values of integrity and strengthening a culture of transparency through a design that blends national identity with international dimensions, reaffirming Algeria's support for global efforts aimed at combating corruption and reinforcing good governance.

From knowledge production to the promotion of integrity:

The university at the heart of the good governance project

Corruption is considered one of the most significant challenges facing modern states, due to its direct negative impact on the integrity of public service, the effectiveness of public policies, and citizens' trust in institutions. The United Nations Convention against Corruption has established a comprehensive legal framework aimed at addressing this phenomenon through a preventive approach, making education and training one of its fundamental pillars.

Article (7) of the Convention stipulates that States Parties, in accordance with their legal and constitutional principles, are committed to developing educational, training, and capacity-building programs for public officials, ensuring that public functions are carried out on the basis of competence, integrity, and merit. It also emphasizes the importance of specialized training in raising awareness of the risks of corruption associated with public service, with the possibility of incorporating codes of conduct and ethical standards designed to promote the values of transparency and accountability.

However, the complexity of corruption and the diversity of its forms require moving beyond traditional legal approaches and adopting a multidisciplinary scientific perspective that combines legal analysis, public policy evaluation, and management sciences. In this context, the High Authority for Transparency, Prevention, and Combating Corruption, in partnership with the Ministry of Higher Education and Scientific Research, has launched a multidisciplinary academic Master's program aimed at studying corruption as a structural phenomenon that can be analyzed and measured, identifying its causes, reducing its risks, and contributing to the development of objective national indicators.

This approach reflects the societal role of the university as a key actor in supporting public policies and promoting good governance, through the training of a specialized academic and research elite capable of producing scientific knowledge that supports decision-makers. Accordingly, integrating academic training into the national anti-corruption strategy represents a strategic choice that reinforces the preventive dimension and contributes to building an integrity system based on knowledge and institutional complementarity.



Participation of the High Authority in the sessions of United Nations meetings on the implementation of the Anti-Corruption Convention and asset recovery in Vienna

International activities

The High Authority for Transparency, Prevention and Fight against Corruption participated at the headquarters of the United Nations Office on Drugs and Crime in Vienna, Austria, from September 1 to 30, 2025, in three important UN events, which included:

- ◆ The 16th resumed session of the Review Team on the Implementation of the United Nations Convention against Corruption,
- ◆ The nineteenth session of the Working Group on Asset Recovery,
- ◆ The fourteenth open-ended meeting of international government experts to strengthen international cooperation.

The Algerian delegation, alongside representatives from the High Authority, included officials from the Ministry of Justice and the National Gendarmerie. Their presence provided an opportunity to coordinate national positions and highlight Algeria's efforts in combating corruption and recovering assets.

During these sessions, the States Parties continued discussions on the next phase of the review mechanism for the implementation of the UN Convention against Corruption, particularly regarding the development of methods to follow up on recommendations from previous reviews and ensuring greater comprehensiveness and transparency in the evaluation process. The meetings also discussed:

- ◆ Strengthening international cooperation in cross-border investigations,
- ◆ Improving mechanisms for recovering assets linked to corruption crimes,

Exchanging practical experiences on emerging legal and technical tools.

This participation reflected Algeria's commitment to actively engage in UN discussions on combating corruption and to monitor the implementation of its international obligations under the Convention. It also affirmed Algeria's dedication to promoting multilateral cooperation by involving its sovereign institutions in such meetings to enhance national expertise and leverage comparative experiences in advancing transparency and good governance.

This multilateral presence projected Algeria as a committed and serious actor on the international stage, seeking to implement practical approaches to strengthen international cooperation and combat corruption in all its forms, with a focus on recovering illicit assets, which is a priority in Algeria's national strategy and international commitments. The session concluded with a set of recommendations centered on enhancing the practical follow-up of review mechanism outcomes, encouraging States Parties to adopt more effective approaches to asset recovery, and developing judicial and criminal cooperation channels between countries. These outcomes are expected to improve tools for international cooperation and strengthen countries' capacity to address challenges related to combating corruption and cross-border financial crimes.

The High Authority highlighted its regional role in a workshop on the Right to Access Information in Qatar.

A delegation from the High Authority for Transparency, Prevention and Fight against Corruption participated in a regional workshop titled “The Right to Access Information,” organized by the Administrative Control and Transparency Authority of Qatar, in coordination with the Palestinian Anti-Corruption Authority, in its capacity as Chair of the fifth session of the Conference of States Parties to the Arab Convention against Corruption.

The High Authority delegation included Mr Fentez Belkhir, member of the High Authority Council, and Mr. Ben Gernan Khaled, Head of Department. They participated alongside representatives from Arab authorities and international experts in the workshop held in Doha from September 15 to 17, 2025.

Discussions focused on the importance of the right to access information as a tool to enhance transparency and strengthen integrity, in addition to exchanging Arab and regional experiences in implementing this right as a fundamental pillar of good governance and building trust between citizens and institutions.

The High Authority’s participation in this event reflects its commitment to engaging in joint regional initiatives and exchanging expertise, reinforcing its national efforts aimed at preventing corruption and promoting transparency. It is noteworthy that through this active participation, the High Authority affirms its position as a leading national body at both regional and international levels and its dedication to contributing to the development of new approaches that strengthen the transparency and anti-corruption framework in the Arab region.



Professor Mesrati participates in G20 Anti-Corruption Ministerial Meeting

Professor Salima Mesrati, President of the High Authority for Transparency and the Prevention and Fight against Corruption, participated on October 30, 2025, in the G20 Ministerial Meeting on Anti-Corruption, held in Mbombela, South Africa.

This high-level international meeting served as an important platform to discuss ways to strengthen global efforts in integrity and anti-corruption and to enhance international cooperation with relevant organizations. During the meeting, the G20 Anti-Corruption Action Plan for the period 2025-2027 was adopted.

The action plan focused on strength-

ening cooperation with specialized international organizations, foremost among them the United Nations Office on Drugs and Crime, and provided an opportunity to exchange experiences and successes among member countries in the fields of corruption prevention and combat.

The international event saw broad participation from ministers and heads of anti-corruption agencies from G20 member countries, along with extensive involvement of invited guest countries. This provided a valuable opportunity to showcase Algeria's pioneering experience in this field and to strengthen its position on the international stage.



Participation of the High Authority in the proceedings of a regional workshop in the Republic of Iraq



At the invitation of the Federal Integrity Commission of the Republic of Iraq, the High Authority for Transparency and the Prevention and Fight against Corruption participated from September 1 to 3, 2025, in a regional workshop organized by the Iraqi authority in cooperation with the Arab League and the German Agency for International Cooperation, and in coordination with the Palestinian Anti-Corruption Authority, on the topic “Parallel Financial Investigation in Corruption Crimes.” The workshop brought together representatives from several Arab anti-corruption authorities, as well as international experts in financial investigation and governance. Its sessions focused on discussing parallel financial investigation mechanisms as an innovative tool to trace illicit financial flows and enhance the effectiveness of pursuing corruption cases.

The workshop aimed to develop participants’ capacities in adopting modern methods for parallel financial investigation, contributing to:

- ◆ Identifying hidden financial links related to corruption crimes,
- ◆ Strengthening the effectiveness of judicial prosecution systems,
- ◆ Supporting joint Arab cooperation in exchanging expertise and modern techniques,

- ◆ Enhancing institutional and legislative frameworks to ensure more effective anti-corruption measures.

The workshop also provided a platform for sharing practical experiences among Arab authorities, particularly regarding the use of financial and accounting tools in investigations, reflecting a growing regional trend toward adopting advanced preventive and technical approaches to address complex corruption crimes.

The participation of the High Authority in this event highlighted Algeria’s commitment to active engagement in regional and international initiatives aimed at developing anti-corruption mechanisms and its focus on strengthening national expertise in financial investigations to support transparency and consolidate the foundations of good governance.

At the conclusion of the workshop, it was noted that the High Authority’s presence in such gatherings reflects Algeria’s positive image as a leading country in anti-corruption efforts at the regional level and affirms its determination to contribute to shaping a shared Arab vision based on enhancing transparency, developing investigation mechanisms, and intensifying multilateral cooperation for more integrity and justice in Arab societies.



Algeria honored at the 4th review meeting of the arab Anti-Corruption convention implementation in Cairo

The High Authority for Transparency, Prevention and Fight against Corruption participated on October 13 and 14, 2025, in the fourth session of the Review Team on the Implementation of the Arab Anti-Corruption Convention and the eighth meeting of the open-ended General Committee of government experts and representatives of independent bodies from the States Parties to the Convention, held at the headquarters of the General Secretariat of the Arab League in Cairo.

The fourth session of the Review Team on the Optimal Implementation of the Arab Anti-Corruption Convention was opened under the chairmanship of M^r. Saeed Shehadeh, representative of the Palestinian Anti-Corruption Authority, with M^r. Qadi Abdel Majid, member of the High Authority Council, representing the People's Democratic Republic of Algeria, and the participation of

a representative from Qatar as the committee rapporteur.

After adopting the agenda, the upcoming evaluation procedures scheduled for 2025 for the Kingdom of Bahrain, the Kingdom of Saudi Arabia, and the Sultanate of Oman were reviewed. Algeria received special recognition during the session for submitting its self-assessment ahead of the scheduled time, even though its review is planned for 2026. This positioned Algeria as a model of voluntary compliance with the Convention and for adopting effective measures and policies to combat corruption within the framework of the Arab Anti-Corruption Convention.

This participation reflects the High Authority's commitment to strengthening joint Arab cooperation, exchanging expertise in the field of anti-corruption, and actively contributing to efforts aimed at achieving the objectives of the Arab Anti-Corruption Convention at the regional level.



Algeria Commemorates African Anti-Corruption Day under the High Patronage of the President of the Republic

As part of the celebration of African Anti-Corruption Day, and under the high patronage of the President of the Republic, Mr. Abdelmadjid Tebboune, the High Authority for Transparency and the Prevention and Fight against Corruption organized, on July 20, 2025, at the Abdelatif Rahal International Conference Center, a regional study day titled: “Asset Recovery in Africa: Legal Frameworks and Best Practices for Achieving Sustainable Development.”

The event witnessed distinguished official participation, including Mr. Lotfi Bougmaâ, Minister of Justice and Keeper of the Seals; Mr. Mostafa Hidaoui, Minister of Youth in charge of the Supreme Youth Council; and Mrs. Salma Bekhta Mansouri, Secretary of State to the Minister of Foreign Affairs in charge of African Affairs. The event also saw the presence of representatives of constitutional bodies, civil society actors, researchers, African delegations, and representatives of the African diplomatic corps accredited in Algeria.

The study day focused on the challenges facing African countries in recovering looted assets, reviewing relevant national, regional, and international legal frameworks, and exchanging experiences on best practices that have proven effective in this field. The event also served as a platform to en-

hance coordination and cooperation among African countries, strengthening their role in the fight against corruption and consolidating the principles of transparency and integrity.

The event was considered a resounding success, reflecting Algeria’s highest political will to advance transparency and combat corruption in all its forms, with particular emphasis on asset recovery as a key tool for achieving sustainable development and safeguarding African national economies.

At the conclusion of the study day, participants agreed that Algeria had set an example in hosting continental events and promoting joint African cooperation. They emphasized that asset recovery requires the concerted efforts of governments, judicial authorities, oversight bodies, and civil society to ensure a transparent economic and institutional environment that serves the aspirations of African peoples.

In her closing remarks, the President of the High Authority, Professor Salima Msarati, affirmed that “commemorating African Anti-Corruption Day in Algeria reflects the Algerian state’s firm commitment to promoting transparency and integrity, and demonstrates its readiness to share its expertise and experiences with African brothers to build a comprehensive and effective system for asset recovery and achieve sustainable development across the continent.”





Dialogue Session on Asset Recovery in Africa

As part of the study day organized to commemorate African Anti-Corruption Day, Mr. Abdelkarim Jaadi, Director General of the Higher School of the Judiciary, chaired a specialized dialogue session on asset recovery mechanisms, with the participation of a selection of national and international experts and specialists.

Mr. Abdelmajid Qadi, member of the High Authority for Transparency and the Prevention and Fight against Corruption, delivered a presentation titled “Asset Recovery as a Tool for Achieving Sustainable Development,” in which he outlined the strategic vision of the High Authority in this field. Mr. Abdelrazak Ben Salem, Director of Criminal Affairs and Amnesty Procedures at the Ministry of Justice, gave a presenta-



tion on “International Cooperation Mechanisms in Asset Recovery from the Perspective of the Algerian Experience,” highlighting achievements and challenges in this area. South Africa contributed a presentation by the head of its Anti-Corruption Author-

ity on “South Africa’s Position on the G20 High-Level Principles for the Management of Seized and Confiscated Assets,” while Ms. Mona Salem, Regional Representative of the United Nations Office on Drugs and Crime’s Anti-Corruption Project, presented the Office’s work in the field of asset recovery. The session served as an important platform for exchanging expertise and experiences among participants and for highlighting best practices in asset recovery as an effective mechanism for combating corruption and achieving sustainable development.

Organisation of the 7th General Assembly of the African Association of Anti-Corruption Authorities in Algeria

On July 21, 2025, at the Abdelatif Rahal International Conference Center, the seventh General Assembly of the African Association of Anti-Corruption Authorities (AAACA) commenced, hosted by the High Authority for Transparency and the Prevention and Fight against Corruption over the course of July 21 and 22, 2025. The opening ceremony was held under the theme “Asset Recovery: Strengthening Cooperation and Sharing Expertise for a Strong and United Africa Against Corruption,” with Professor Salima Mesrati, President of the High Authority for

Transparency and the Prevention and Fight against Corruption, presiding over the inauguration of the General Assembly. The assembly saw the participation of heads and representatives of anti-corruption authorities from 30 African countries, providing an important opportunity to strengthen regional cooperation and exchange expertise in the fields of anti-corruption and asset recovery. Algeria’s hosting of this significant event reflects the High Authority’s ongoing efforts in combating corruption at the regional level and underscores its belief in the importance of collective action to confront corruption across the African continent.

The President of the High Authority for Transparency, Prevention and Fight against Corruption, Professor Salima Mesrati, participated as part of the official Algerian delegation in the 11th session of the Conference of the States Parties to the United Nations Convention against Corruption (UNCAC), held in Doha, Qatar, from December 15 to 19, 2025.

In addition to Professor Mesrati, the high-level, multi-sectoral delegation included officials from the High Authority and representatives from the Ministry of Justice, the Ministry of National Defense, the Ministry of Foreign Affairs and the National Community Abroad, the Ministry of Interior, Local Authorities and Transport, the General Directorate of National Security, and the Financial Intelligence Processing Unit.

The Algerian delegation recorded an active and qualitative participation in the session, reaffirming Algeria's commitment to strengthening transparency and consolidating the principles of integrity at both national and international levels.

The participation of the High Authority was marked by effective contributions in plenary sessions and side events through interventions highlighting Algeria's experience and practical



measures taken in the field of anti-corruption, reflecting the strong political will of the Algerian State and its determination to continue engaging in relevant international efforts.

The Minister of Justice, Keeper of the Seals, Mr. Lotfi Boudjemaa, delivered a speech on the first day of the conference via videoconference.

On the second day, the High Authority delegation, led by Professor Mesrati, took part in several plenary sessions and side events dedicated to strengthening corruption prevention mechanisms, exchanging expertise and best practices, and enhancing international cooperation between countries and anti-corruption bodies, in the presence of the Algerian Ambassador to Qatar, M^r. Salah Attia.

The third day's sessions were devoted to presenting and discussing measures related to corruption prevention and combat.

On this occasion, Professor Salima Mesrati delivered a speech highlighting Algeria's international commitment to strengthening the national integrity system and consolidating the principles of transparency and good governance, reflecting the firm political will of the Algerian State and its deep commitment to fighting corruption.

She reaffirmed Algeria's continued engagement in international anti-corruption efforts and renewed its determination to further align its na-

tional system with international standards. She also emphasized the High Authority's practical measures and innovative initiatives in corruption prevention, particularly through strengthening transparency mechanisms, promoting integrity, and embedding a culture of accountability—based on the conviction that integrity, transparency, and accountability are essential pillars in building strong institutions and achieving sustainable development.

On the fourth day, the High Authority delegation participated in the work of the Arab Anti-Corruption and Integrity Network, in which Algeria is an active member. The sessions were dedicated to evaluating achievements and activities carried out in recent years, reviewing progress toward set objectives, strengthening dialogue on integrity strategies in recovery and reconstruction efforts in conflict-affected contexts, and exploring ways to enhance cross-border partnerships for the 2026–2028 period. During its intervention, the delegation highlighted Algeria's experience in strengthening the integrity system, particularly through the adoption of a dedicated whistleblower protection law, considered a key mechanism to encourage reporting corruption and ensure legal and institutional protection against retaliation. The delegation stressed that this legislative framework is part of a comprehensive national approach to

promoting transparency and institutional trust, in line with international and regional commitments, and emphasized the importance of continued joint action within the Arab Network. Throughout the conference, the High Authority's pavilion witnessed significant attendance and notable interest from participating delegations.

INTENSE ACTIVITY AND WIDE PARTICIPATION

The High Authority organized a side event on the margins of the Conference, attended by the Algerian Ambassador to Qatar, the multi-sectoral Algerian delegation, and representatives from several countries.

Professor Mesrati presented Algeria's experience in promoting integrity and strengthening evaluation and governance mechanisms.

During this event, Council Member Professor Hamza Khodri, along with Dr. Djamel Remini, an executive at the High Authority, delivered a detailed scientific presentation on the "Efficiency-Integrity Index," explaining its methodological background, objectives, and main criteria—particularly regarding measuring compliance with transparency and integrity principles and the effectiveness of corruption prevention mechanisms within public institutions.

Professor Mesrati emphasized that the "Efficiency-Integrity Index" is a strategic tool and a scientific methodology for assessing transparency and anti-corruption efforts, contributing to

improved public performance, enhanced trust in public services, and embedding integrity as a sustainable institutional choice.

The presentation was well received, with several Arab and African countries expressing interest in benefiting from and adapting the Algerian experience to their national contexts.

PROFESSOR MESRATI MEETS THE CHAIRPERSON OF THE AFRICAN UNION ADVISORY BOARD ON CORRUPTION

Professor Salima Mesrati, President of the High Authority for Transparency, Prevention and Fight against Corruption, held a meeting with the Chairperson of the African Union Advisory Board on Corruption, on the sidelines of the Conference of the States Parties to the United Nations Convention against Corruption held in Doha, at the invitation of the Chairperson of the Advisory Board to examine prospects for cooperation between the two parties.

The representative of the Advisory Board affirmed that the body he currently chairs can accompany and assist national anti-corruption bodies that are members of the African Union Convention on Preventing and Combating Corruption in various fields, by providing and mobilizing experts to supervise the preparation of studies concerned with monitoring corruption perceptions in Africa. He also indicated that the recent reforms undertaken by the Board within the framework of its restructuring have enabled





it to extend its mandate from two years to six years, which constitutes an opportunity to build a bridge for long-term cooperation.

For her part, the President of the High Authority affirmed that this meeting represents an opportunity to embody Algeria's attachment to its African identity and its regional commitments undertaken within the framework of its accession to the African Union Convention on Preventing and Combating Corruption.

The President also commended this initiative, considering it a qualitative step that would enable many of the practices and initiatives launched by the High Authority to benefit from African expertise, while at the same time providing the opportunity to share and exchange Algerian experience in this field, within the framework of exchanging experiences and strengthening cooperation at the continental level.

... AND RECEIVES THE REPRESENTATIVE OF THE STATE OF PALESTINE

Professor Salima Mesrati, President of the High Authority for Transparency, Prevention and Fight against Corruption, received a delegation from the Palestinian Anti-Corruption Commission headed by Dr. Raed Radwan. The meeting was devoted to discussing ways to strengthen



future cooperation between the two parties, particularly in the field of educating youth on the values of integrity and transparency and consolidating the principles of citizenship and ethical conduct.

During the meeting, the President of the High Authority also provided a comprehensive presentation on the High Authority's strategy, its main objectives and goals, particularly with regard to strengthening corruption prevention, promoting transparency, and adopting educational and awareness-based approaches as a strategic choice for building and consolidating a culture of integrity in the long term.

High Authority Participates in International Meeting in Libya



On the occasion of the International Anti-Corruption Day, and at the invitation of the United Nations Office on Drugs and Crime (UNODC), Professor Kadi Abdelmadjid, Member of the Council of the High Authority for Transparency, Prevention and Fight against Corruption, participated in the Experts Meeting on the Implementation of Anti-Corruption Strat-

egies, held in Libya from December 9 to 11, 2025. During this international meeting, the representative of the High Authority delivered a presentation on Algeria's experience in implementing the National Anti-Corruption Strategy, highlighting the approach adopted to enhance transparency and promote integrity within institutions.

The meeting provided a valuable opportunity for international experts to learn about Algeria's efforts in combating corruption and developing prevention mechanisms, reflecting its firm commitment to international standards and multilateral partnership objectives.





Signing of a Cooperation Agreement between the High Authority for Transparency and the High Council for Youth

As part of the activities commemorating African Anti-Corruption Day, on July 20, 2025, a cooperation agreement was signed between the High Authority for Transparency, Prevention and Fight against Corruption and the High Council for Youth, in the presence of the Minister of Youth, Mr. Moustafa Hidaoui, and Professor Salima Mesrati, President of the High Authority.

The agreement aims to strengthen coordination and joint cooperation between the two parties in the field of corruption prevention and combat. It seeks to establish a strategic partnership to engage youth in efforts to promote integrity and transparency.

The agreement includes several key areas, such as organizing joint training programs, launching awareness initiatives for young people, involving them in campaigns to raise



awareness about the risks of corruption, and developing mechanisms to enhance their participation in promoting values of integrity within society.

The signing of this agreement represents a practical implementation of the National Strategy for Transparency, Prevention, and Fight against Corruption, and reflects the belief in the pivotal role of youth in building a society guided by values of integrity and transparency.

Cooperation Agreement Signing between the High Authority for Transparency and the Financial Inquiry Processing Unit

As part of the activities commemorating African Anti-Corruption Day, during the study day held at the International Conference Center on July 20, 2025, a bilateral cooperation agreement was signed between the High Authority for Transparency and the Prevention and Fight against Corruption and the Financial Inquiry Processing Unit.

The agreement aims to strengthen the framework for coordination and joint action between the two parties in areas of mutual interest, particularly in combating financial crimes and reducing money laundering and terrorism financing, which represent key aspects of fi-



nancial and economic corruption.

The agreement includes provisions for developing mechanisms to exchange information and expertise between the two institutions, enhancing capacities to monitor and analyze

suspicious financial indicators, and cooperating in studies and research related to the prevention of economic crimes.

This partnership reflects full alignment between the objectives of the National Strategy for Transparency, Prevention and Fight against Corruption and the mandate of the Financial Inquiry Processing Unit, aiming to strengthen financial governance and the transparency of economic transactions.



STRENGTHENING DIGITALIZATION AND SUPPORTING ANTI-CORRUPTION EFFORTS

The High Authority for Transparency Launches New Digital Platforms and Mobile Applications

In line with the national digital transformation strategy and in support of transparency mechanisms, the High Authority for Transparency, Prevention and Fight Against Corruption launched, on the sidelines of the study day organized on the occasion of International Anti-Corruption Day, a set of new digital platforms and mobile applications representing a qualitative leap in modernizing work tools and consolidating principles of good governance:

◆ Property Declaration Platform:

A digital system for public officials and local elected representatives, offering a modern interface that facilitates the property declaration process through the “Muktatib” portal. It ensures real-time and secure data processing and provides monitoring access for focal points within institutions and administrations.

◆ Platform for Monitoring the Implementation of the National Strategy for Transparency and Corruption Prevention:

A practical workspace for focal points in public bodies, allowing data entry, analysis of implementation rates, issuance

of periodic reports, and access to smart dashboards enabling real-time tracking and impact evaluation. It also allows the National Committee to closely monitor the level of strategy implementation.

◆ Interconnection Platform Between the High Authority and the Ministry of Justice: A secure and direct referral system connecting the High Authority with public prosecutors and judicial authorities. It provides a fully digital process for managing notifications and reports with the aim of speeding up the handling of corruption cases and ensuring timely delivery of files.

◆ A mobile extension of the “Balaghna” platform, allowing citizens to submit reports and track them easily by phone, in a framework guaranteeing confidentiality, speed, and effectiveness.

◆ Application “Narakom”:

A tool designed to empower the Algerian Transparency Network by facilitating coordination, data entry, and real-time monitoring of activities and initiatives in an organized and structured manner.



Bilateral Meetings on the Sidelines of the 7th General Assembly of the African Union Anti-Corruption Agencies

On the sidelines of the 7th General Assembly of the African Association of Anti-Corruption Authorities held in Algeria, a bilateral meeting was held between the President of the High Authority for Transparency, Prevention and Fight against Corruption, Professor Salima Mesrati, and the President of the Libyan Administrative Control Authority, Mr. Abdullah Gadirboh, in the presence of the Libyan Ambassador to Algeria, M^r Saleh Hemma.

During this meeting, held on July 22, 2025, the two sides discussed ways and prospects for strengthening bilateral cooperation and exchanging expertise in the field of corruption prevention and combat, including deliberations on preparing a memorandum of understanding between the two institutions.

The meeting provided an opportunity to review the experiences of both countries in combating corruption and to examine the mechanisms and strategies adopted in this field. It also represented an important step toward enhancing regional cooperation between anti-corruption authorities in the two sister countries.

Both parties expressed their commitment to deep-

ening joint cooperation and to developing the legal and institutional framework necessary to achieve the desired integration in the field of corruption prevention and combat.

Meeting between the High Authority for Transparency and Its Ivorian Counterpart

On the sidelines of the seventh General Assembly of the African Association of Anti-Corruption Authorities, hosted by Algeria from July 20 to 22, 2025, a bilateral meeting was held between Professor Salima Mesrati, President of the High Authority for Transparency, Prevention and Fight against Corruption, and her counterpart, the President of the High Authority for Good Governance of the Republic of Côte d'Ivoire, in the presence of the Ivorian Ambassador accredited to Algeria.

During this meeting, conducted within the framework of strengthening joint African cooperation, the two sides discussed ways and prospects for enhancing bilateral cooperation and exchanging expertise in the field of corruption prevention and combat, reviewing both the Algerian and Ivorian experiences in this area.

The meeting also provided an opportunity to discuss mechanisms for implementing the memoran-



dum of understanding signed between the two authorities and to explore new partnership opportunities in capacity building and information exchange, serving the shared strategic objectives of both countries in fighting corruption.

Both parties emphasized the importance of strengthening regional cooperation among anti-corruption authorities in Africa and working to unify efforts to address corruption, which remains a major obstacle to sustainable development on the continent.

Meeting between the High Authority for Transparency and Its Burkinabe Counterpart

On the sidelines of the seventh General Assembly of the African Association of Anti-Corruption Authorities, hosted by Algeria from July 20 to 22, 2025, a bilateral meeting was held between Professor Salima Mesrati, President of the High Authority for Transparency. Prevention and Fight against Corruption, and her counterpart, the President of the High Authority for Control and Anti-

Corruption of the Republic of Burkina Faso, in the presence of the Burkinabe Ambassador accredited to Algeria.

During this meeting, the two sides discussed ways and prospects for enhancing joint cooperation between the two authorities, with a particular focus on training and the exchange of expertise in areas of mutual interest, reviewing both the Algerian and Burkinabe experiences in combating corruption.

The meeting also provided an opportunity to discuss mechanisms for implementing bilateral cooperation in capacity building and technical expertise exchange, with an agreement to explore the possibility of signing a memorandum of understanding to strengthen and develop this cooperation.

Both parties emphasized the importance of consolidating collaboration among anti-corruption authorities in African countries, aiming to achieve the desired integration in the field of corruption prevention and combat across the continent.

Cooperative Meeting with the African Union of Anti-Corruption Authorities



In the framework of strengthening bilateral cooperation at the African level in the field of anti-corruption, on November 4, 2025, a video conference was held between officials of the High Authority for Transparency and the Prevention and Fight against Corruption and members of the Executive Bureau of the African Union of Anti-Corruption Authorities.

The meeting provided an opportunity to discuss ways to enhance joint cooperation and exchange expertise in corruption prevention and combat across the continent, reviewing mechanisms for joint work and prospects for coordination in future programs and activities.

The meeting focused on exploring ways to implement memoranda of understanding signed between the two parties, discussing the possibility of organizing joint training sessions, exchanging visits between experts, and participating in training programs organized by the Union.

It also served as an opportunity to review the latest developments in anti-corruption efforts across Africa and to benefit from the successful experiences of member states in the Union, with both sides expressing their commitment to strengthening bilateral cooperation to serve shared goals in promoting integrity and transparency.



Signing of a Cooperation Agreement between the High Authority for Transparency and the Algerian Institute of Advanced Financial Studies

In the framework of strengthening institutional cooperation and developing the system of training and expertise exchange, November 20, 2025, Professor Salima Mesrati, President of the High Authority for Transparency, Prevention and Fight against Corruption, received M^{rs}. Mariam Wanas, Director General of the Algerian Institute of Advanced Financial Studies, along with her accompanying delegation and officials from the High Authority, where a cooperation agreement was signed. The agreement aims to promote values of integrity and transparency, particularly by consolidating a culture of governance within the economic sector.

This agreement falls within the High Authority's 2026 action plan, designed to implement the National Strategy for Corruption Prevention and Combat, particularly its third objective, which focuses on enhancing transparency and integrity in the economic sector.

The provisions of the agreement also establish a practical framework regulating coordination mechanisms between the two institutions, particularly in the areas of designing and implementing training programs, financial auditing, and strengthening capacities to assess the effectiveness of transparency systems and oversight mechanisms.

On January 6, 2024, the Algerian Network for Transparency “Narakom” was inaugurated under the supervision of Professor Salima Mesrati, Chairperson of the High Authority for Transparency, Prevention, and the Fight Against Corruption. The association for Scientific and Recreational Activities for Youth (STEM) in the municipality of Saïda is one of its 96 members, representing various regions of the country and multiple civil society organizations.

Our association considers the network an excellent initiative that strengthens our role as civil society in promoting transparency, preventing, and combating corruption, in line with the objectives and civic values outlined in the 2020 Constitution aimed at building a new Algeria.

Moreover, the “Narakom” Network also serves as a mechanism established under legal frameworks to enhance participatory democracy and good governance, thereby achieving the highest efficiency in public affairs management. Our involvement as civil society actors thus presents both a challenge and an opportunity, intersecting with several mechanisms aimed at achieving targeted development. Since our induction, our association has sought to transform traditional approaches in engaging with all community stakeholders through purposeful activities, such as training programs designed to instill integrity values and enhance the effectiveness of civil society work. This approach was especially reinforced by the training we received from the High Authority for Transparency, Prevention, and the Fight Against Corruption in the wilayas of Mostaganem and Bouira, which aligned perfectly with our aspirations.

Promptly, we initiated a special activity in coordination with the Saïda Court Council—a study day under the initiative titled “Istaqim” aimed at fostering a culture of reporting, particularly in light of the legal framework established by the Algerian state to protect whistleblowers. The event was highly appreciated, especially following the presentation of recent legal developments protecting whistleblowers.

We received full support and facilitation from the Director of Training at the High Authority for Transparency, as well as from the President, Prosecutor General, and Secretary-General of the Saïda Court Council, ensuring that our activity was conducted under optimal conditions. This demonstrates that civil society now has the opportunity to contribute effectively to the national transparency strategy and to reinforce integrity values.

Our colleagues and we, having completed the aforementioned training sessions provided by the Authority, are now preparing for several national and local activities. We are grateful to the High Authority for Transparency for the trust it has placed in our association, alongside other network members. Through this, we are consolidating the tools and mechanisms necessary to implement the national strategy in this domain, in pursuit of objective integrity goals, and contributing to the construction of a cohesive nation with strong foundations, ensuring a dignified life for all.



Thematic Workshop on the National Strategy for Transparency, Prevention of Corruption within the Framework of Youth Camps in Bejaia

Within the framework of specialized youth camps organized by the High Council for Youth at the training center of the National Social Security Fund in Bejaia Province, on September 2, 2025, Mr. Khaled Ben Qarnan, an official of the High Authority for Transparency, Prevention and Fight against Corruption, led a thematic workshop dedicated to presenting and discussing the National Strategy for Transparency and the Prevention and Fight against Corruption.

During this workshop, the focus was placed on the following points:

- ◆ Rejecting corruption, which has historically acted as an obstacle to sustainable development and undermined citizens' trust in institutions.
- ◆ Instilling a culture of integrity and transparency across various sectors, particularly among youth, who are considered the cornerstone for building a fairer and more transparent society.
- ◆ Raising youth awareness about the risks of corruption by discussing its economic, social, and political impacts on the future of the country.
- ◆ Presenting the civil and institutional mechanisms adopted for preventing and combating corruption, including laws, regulations, and

community and educational initiatives.

Participants actively engaged with the High Authority official's presentations, raising questions and ideas on ways to establish a culture of integrity within academic and social environments. They expressed their interest in contributing to national efforts to combat corruption and build strong, transparent institutions.

This participation reflected the High Authority's commitment to engaging youth in national discussions on transparency and good governance, recognizing them as key actors in driving change and promoting responsible citizenship. It also underscored the Authority's dedication to implementing the awareness and educational dimensions of the National Strategy, alongside its legislative and institutional aspects.

At the end of the event, the role of the High Council for Youth in organizing these specialized camps was praised, as they provided an appropriate platform to enhance awareness and educate youth on the values of integrity. This collaboration between the Council and the High Authority was recognized as a strong strategic partnership, contributing to the development of an informed generation capable of actively participating in promoting transparency and consolidating the foundations of good governance.

Training Session for the Members of “Narakom” Network in Mostaganem



On 14 October 2025 in Mostaganem, the President of the High Authority for Transparency, Prevention and Fight Against Corruption, Professor Salima Mesrati, supervised the opening of the “training-of-trainers” session organized by the High Authority in coordination with the state of Mostaganem.

This session, hosted by the Wilaya of Mostaganem under the slogan “Continuous Training for an Effective Civil Society in Combating Corruption,” represented an important opportunity to qualify the members of the Algerian Transparency Network

“Narakom,” in the presence of Wali of Mostaganem, Ahmed Boudouh.

This initiative fell within the framework of strengthening the capacities of civil society in the field of promoting transparency, preventing corruption, and combating it, with the aim of building a solid partnership between state institutions and civil society actors.

In her speech, the President praised the concrete steps Algeria has taken in this field, affirming that the state, under the leadership of the President of the Republic, Mr. Abdelmadjid Tebboune, has undertaken a series of important measures, including the creation of constitutional bod-



ies and institutions to fight corruption, the issuance of laws criminalizing conflict of interest and abuse of influence, and the reinforcement of digitalization in vital sectors to limit bribery and non-transparent practices.

She also emphasized the great importance of activating the role of civil society as an effective partner in monitoring, awareness-raising, and promoting a culture of integrity, noting that the creation of the Algerian Transparency Network “Narakom” came to reinforce this approach.

She added that this training session constituted an important step in qualifying trainers and providing them with the knowledge and skills necessary to support the reform process and strengthen community oversight.

At the end of the meeting, the Wali of Mostaganem committed to adopting the “Enazaha” efficiency indicator at the level of the state, while the activities of this training session were held over the course of 14 and 15 October 2025.

Training Session on Corruption Investigation at the Police Academy in Ain-Benian

As part of the implementation of the annual sectoral training and skills-enhancement plan of the General Directorate of National Security, a specialized training session on “Investigation Techniques in the Field of Combating Corruption” was organized at the “Mohamed Ouadah” Police School in Ain Benian.

Mr. Marouane Ben Rahmoun, Head of Division at the High Authority for Transparency, Prevention and Fight against Corruption, participated in this training session, where he delivered a valuable presentation on “The Experience of the High Authority for Transparency, Prevention and fight against Corruption in Handling Corruption Reports.”

The presentation addressed the mechanisms and procedures adopted by the High Authority for receiving and processing corruption-related reports, as well as the methodology used in examining and analyzing these reports, with reference to key examples and practical experiences in this field.

This training session represented a practical demonstration of constructive cooperation between the High Authority for Transparency and the General Directorate of National Security, in an effort to strengthen national capacities in the field of combating and preventing corruption, and to enable security personnel to acquire the tools and mechanisms necessary to efficiently address the phenomenon of corruption.



Organizing a Training Session on “Preparing and Implementing a Corruption Risk Map in the Public Sector”



As part of strengthening the capacities of executives and staff within public institutions and administrations, the High Authority for Transparency, Prevention and Fight against Corruption organized a specialized training session on “Preparing and Implementing a Corruption Risk Map in the Public Sector,” held on 25, 26, and 27 October 2025 at the Ministry of Culture. This training session constituted an important opportunity to develop the participants’ competencies and to equip them with the tools and procedures necessary for preparing and implementing corruption risk maps within their institutions, aiming to enhance their skills in identifying, assessing, and managing

corruption risks. The training program focused on several key areas, including the methodology for identifying corruption risks, mechanisms for assessing the level of these risks, methods for developing action plans to mitigate them, as well as approaches for monitoring and evaluating the effectiveness of implementing risk maps.

This initiative represented the practical embodiment of the High Authority’s strategy aimed at promoting a culture of integrity and transparency in the public sector, and contributing to building the capacities of national cadres in the field of preventing and combating corruption, in a way that serves the goals of sustainable development and reinforces the principles of good governance.

Organizing a Training Session for the Solidarity Sector in Tipaza



On November 5, 2025, Mr. Marwan Ben Rahmoun and Mr. Maasho Mahfoud, officials of the High Authority for Transparency, Prevention and fight against Corruption, supervised and facilitated a training and awareness course for the benefit of the staff and employees of the National Solidarity Sector in Tipaza. The themes of this training course focused on reviewing the contents of the High Authority for Transparency, Prevention and fight against Corruption, as well as the legal framework regulating the work of the High Authority for Transparency, Prevention, and Combating Corruption. The lecturers provided a detailed explanation of the mecha-

nisms and procedures adopted in this field. This course represented an opportunity to strengthen participants' capacities in the field of corruption prevention and to inform them of the latest legislative and institutional developments in this domain. It also provided a chance for direct communication between the High Authority and field actors in the National Solidarity Sector. This initiative embodied the practical implementation of the High Authority's strategy aimed at promoting a culture of integrity and transparency across all sectors and involving various stakeholders in national efforts to combat corruption, in pursuit of sustainable development goals and the consolidation of good governance values.



Training Session on the Second Phase of the Program for “Narakom” Network Members in Bouira



On 12 November 2025, Professor Salima Mesrati, President of the High Authority for Transparency, Prevention and fight against Corruption, supervised the opening of the second and final phase of the training-of-trainers session organized by the High Authority in cooperation with the Ministry of Interior, Local Authorities, and Communication, and the Province of Bouira.

The Province of Bouira hosted the activities of this training session directed to members of the committee of the Algerian Transparency Network “Narakom,” under the slogan “Continuous training... for an active civil society in combating corruption,” representing a continuation of efforts to strengthen the capacities of civil society in the

areas of transparency, prevention, and combating corruption.

In her opening speech, the President emphasized the vital role of civil society as an essential partner in promoting integrity and consolidating the values of accountability and transparency, noting that international and regional conventions have called on States Parties to create an enabling environment that ensures effective participation of civil society organizations.

Professor Mesrati revealed that the High Authority is currently working on preparing a new regulatory text inviting associations to adopt transparency systems within their structures, and highlighted that participatory democracy represents a fundamental element in achieving sustainable social development.



The training session included presentations by members of the High Authority's Council, its executives, and professors from the University of Bouira, in addition to interactive workshops in which explanations were provided on transparency systems and tools for evaluating public policies within the framework of participatory democracy.

The activities concluded with the President affirming that the success of combating corruption remains a collective responsibility requiring the commitment of both the State and society alike, in order to build a new Algeria that adopts integrity, justice, and transparency as its guiding principles.

Honoring the Wali of Bouira and Presenting Specialized Interventions at the Closing of the "Narakom" Training Course

On November 13, 2025, the activities of the training course for trainer formation, organized by the High Authority for Transparency, Prevention and Fight Against Corruption in coordination with the Ministry of Interior, Local Authorities, Transport, and the state of Bouira, continued, with the final day witnessing the holding of a specialized dialogue session for the members of the Algerian Transparency Network "Narakom."

The session included four specialized interventions. The first was presented by Professor Qadi Abdelmajid, member of the High Authority Council, on "The Role of Civil Society in Evaluating Public Policies to Achieve Participatory Democracy," while Professor Khodri Hamza, member of the High Authority Council, addressed in the second intervention "Activating the Role of Civil Society in Implementing the Second Goal of the National Strategy for Transparency, Prevention, and Combating Corruption."

Dr. Aissani Yacout Amal, member of the High Authority Council, presented an intervention on "Reporting Corruption: Legal Obligation or Social Culture?" while Professor Louni Farida from the University of Bouira discussed "University Governance: Between Transparency Require-

ments and Corruption Risks."

At the conclusion of the session, Professor Salima Mesrati, Chair of the High Authority, honored Mrs. Houria Aqqoune, Wali of Bouira, in recognition of her cooperation and effective contribution to the success of this training course. The intervening professors were also honored in appreciation of their academic and professional contributions.

This training course, held over November 12–13, 2025, embodied the practical partnership between the High Authority and the state of Bouira, aiming to strengthen the capacities of civil society in the fields of transparency, prevention, and combating corruption.

Closing of the Second Phase of the "Narakom" Training Course

On November 13, 2025, the second phase of the training course for trainer formation, aimed at the members of the Algerian Transparency Network Committee "Narakom," concluded, with the second day witnessing the holding of a committee meeting to review the items on the agenda.

The agenda included:

- ◆ Appointment of the Chair and Vice-Chair of the Algerian Transparency Network Office.
- ◆ Presentation of the comprehensive report on the Network's activities since its establishment.
- ◆ Detailed explanation of the digital platform "Narakom" in its new version, as an advanced interactive tool to enhance communication among Network members and facilitate the monitoring of field programs and initiatives in the areas of transparency, prevention, and combating corruption.

At the conclusion of the activities, participation certificates were awarded to the members of the Network Committee who successfully completed the stages of this training course, in an atmosphere characterized by a spirit of cooperation and high responsibility, underscoring the collective commitment to continue efforts to consolidate the values of integrity and transparency at the national level.



Study Day on the Prevention of Corruption Crimes in Public Economic Institutions

Professor Salima Mesrati, President of the High Authority for Transparency, Prevention and Fight against Corruption, and Mr. Sid Ali Zerrouki, Minister of Post and Telecommunications, inaugurated a study day on “Prevention of Corruption Crimes in Public Economic Institutions” on November 30, 2025. The event was attended by members of the High Authority, as well as executives and managers from institutions under the Ministry’s supervision.

In her opening speech, President Mesrati emphasized the importance of strengthening public officials’ integrity, highlighting the National Strategy’s role in promoting transparency and competitiveness in the business environment and

enhancing integrity within economic institutions. She noted that public economic institutions will soon implement effective transparency systems under Law 22-08, aiming to promote accountability and good governance.

The High Authority plans to expand the list of public officials required to declare their assets, particularly managers of institutions with large budgets. President Mesrati stressed that digitalization is key to establishing transparency and integrity within institutions, and the High Authority will continue to support institutions in consolidating good governance principles. The study day featured presentations by High Authority members and speakers from judicial and regulatory bodies, discussing prevention approach-

es, integrity, and transparency within economic institutions. The event concluded with a framework agreement between the High Authority and the Ministry, strengthening public officials' capacities in preventing corruption and supporting the development of a sectoral corruption risk map.



Awareness Campaign to Support National Efforts to Promote Awareness and Consolidate a Culture of Integrity within the Sector

The High Authority for Transparency, Prevention and fight against Corruption participated in the awareness campaign launched by the Ministry of National Solidarity, Family, and Women's Issues on November 26 and 27, 2025, as part of supporting national efforts to promote awareness and consolidate a culture of integrity within the sector. Officials from the Authority contributed to facilitating the training course organized by the Directorate of Social Solidarity of Algiers at the National Center for Specialized Staff Training, by delivering presentations and interventions addressing the application of integrity values, in alignment with the High Authority for Transparency, Prevention and fight against Corruption.





Training session for the benefit of Ministry of Solidarity staff

Professor Salima Mesrati, President of the High Authority for Transparency, Prevention and Fight against Corruption, along with M^{rs}. Soraya Mouloudji, Minister of National Solidarity, Family, and Women's Affairs, supervised this morning, December 1st, 2025, the opening of the media and training day dedicated to the launch of the digital platform for reporting corruption, as well as the presentation of the Code of Conduct and Professional Ethics, in the presence of officials from both sides and representatives of national and constitutional bodies.

In her speech, the President of the High Authority emphasized that the choice of the Ministry of National Solidarity, Family, and Women's Affairs for these vital topics is a clear indication of the sector's strategic vision in safeguarding the public interest and ensuring that support and services reach their rightful beneficiaries with full transparency and fairness. This initiative also falls within the practical implementation of the commitments of the National Strat-

egy for Transparency, Prevention, and Fight against Corruption, enabling the Ministry to strengthen its capacity for rapid response to citizens' needs. This initiative also represents a firm commitment to embodying international standards, particularly those outlined in the United Nations Convention against Corruption regarding the protection of whistleblowers, as this protection constitutes a fundamental pillar for promoting integrity and consolidating trust in public institutions.

In the same context, the Code of Conduct serves as an ethical charter guiding the performance of the Ministry's employees, reinforcing a culture of public service based on responsibility and respect for professional duties.

Officials from the High Authority also conducted a training session for the staff of the Ministry of National Solidarity, Family, and Women's Affairs, covering several specialized topics, particularly regarding asset declaration, mechanisms for enhancing transparency, and reporting corruption.



Study Day for the Judicial Police of the National Gendarmerie School



As part of the continuation of its training and awareness activities in the field of corruption prevention and combating corruption, the High Authority for Transparency, Prevention and Fight against Corruption organized, on December 2, 2025, a study day at its headquarters for the benefit of 30 trainees from the judicial police of the National Gendarmerie School in Yesser. Presentations were delivered by senior officials from the High Authority, addressing the legal and institutional framework for



combating corruption, and presenting the content of the “Nazaha” efficiency index as a tool for evaluating the efforts of public institutions in the fight against corruption and as support for implementing the National Strategy for Transparency, Prevention and Fight against Corruption. The presentations also addressed procedures for reporting corruption under Law 22-08, administrative and financial investigations into illicit enrichment of public officials, as well as asset declaration procedures.

Training Session for Agricultural Cooperation Executives

The High Authority for Transparency, Prevention and Fight against Corruption, in cooperation with the National Fund for Agricultural Cooperation, organized a training session for agricultural cooperation executives at both central and regional levels on December 10

and 11, 2025, at the Fund’s Training and Multi-Service Center in Oran.

The session was supervised by members of the Authority’s Council: Ms. Nassira Kafi, Professor Hamza Khodri, Mr. Jelawi Mohamed, in addition to Mr. Ait Hadjam Daoud, an executive at the High Authority.



The session included presentations by members of the Authority’s Council addressing the National Strategy for Transparency, Prevention and Fight against Corruption (2023–2027), in addition to presenting the legal and institutional framework for corruption prevention in Algeria and mechanisms for detecting and preventing corrupt practices, thereby strengthening the institution’s executives’ capacities and consolidating their skills in this field.



Representatives of the High Authority Participate in the “Leaders of Algerian Youth” Forum

Within the framework of the agreement concluded between the High Authority for Transparency, Prevention and the Fight against Corruption and the High Council for Youth, Mr. Haroun Hazil, Deputy Director for Monitoring and Evaluation of the Progress of Administrative and Financial Investigations, accompanied by Mr. Ammar Matrouni, took part in the “Leaders of Algerian Youth” forum organized by the High Council for Youth from 25 to 28 December 2025 in the province of Biskra.

Representatives of the High Authority delivered a session entitled “Strengthening the Values of Transparency and Responsibility: Youth as Active Partners in Corruption Prevention,” which was devoted to presenting the measures of the National Strategy for Transparency, Prevention and the Fight against Corruption in its youth-related dimension. The session also aimed to raise awareness among young people of the risks of unethical practices and their repercussions on society, intro-



duce the mechanisms for reporting corruption in accordance with the applicable legal framework, and highlight the role of youth in promoting a responsible and effective institutional environment. Throughout the days of the forum, interactive discussions were also organized to respond to the various questions raised by participants regarding the missions and powers of the High Authority and the means of preventing and combating corruption. These discussions witnessed notable engagement, during which representatives of the Authority emphasized that youth constitute a fundamental pillar and a key partner in consolidating the values of integrity and transparency.

Training Seminar in Coordination with the General Directorate of National Security

A training course entitled “Administrative and Financial Investigations in the Crime of Illicit Enrichment of a Public Official Unable to Justify a Significant Increase in His Financial Assets” was organized at the Ali Tounsi Higher School of Police from 29 to 31 December 2025. The course aimed to strengthen the capacities of the executives of the High Authority and equip them with technical tools and specialized knowledge that enable the detection, handling, and adjudication of cases of illicit enrichment, in accordance with the provisions of Article 5 of Law No. 22-08 relating to the organization of the High Authority and its powers.

This course, the first of its kind, addressed the

field of administrative and financial investigation by combining the specialized expertise of the executives of the High Authority with the operational expertise of the General Directorate of National Security. Its objective was to prepare a practical guide containing the procedures and measures in force in the fight against the crime of illicit enrichment of public officials, within the framework of the provisions of Law No. 22-08.

The organization of this seminar falls within the framework of implementing the memorandum of understanding concluded between the High Authority for Transparency, Prevention and the Fight against Corruption and the General Directorate of National Security.

Study Day in Partnership with the Ministry of Interior

The Ministry of Interior, Local Authorities and Transport, in partnership with the High Authority for Transparency, Prevention and Fight against Corruption, organized a study day on the “National Strategy for Transparency, Prevention and Fight against Corruption,” hosted by the National School of Administration on December 15, 2025. The study day was attended by executives from the Ministry of Interior, Local Authorities and

Transport, along with executives and students of the National School of Administration.

Professor Abdelmadjid Gadi, member of the Council of the High Authority, delivered a presentation addressing the establishment and missions of the Authority, the National Strategy for Transparency and Corruption Prevention, as well as the adopted strategic objectives and the integrity indicators used for evaluation and monitoring.

Organization of the “Istiqim” Initiative for Reporting Corruption

Within the framework of the Algerian Transparency Network “Narakom,” established by the High Authority for Transparency, Prevention and Fight against Corruption, Professor Nassira Amari, President of the

Association for Scientific and Recreational Activities for Youth in Saïda Province, which is part of the network, organized the “Istiqim” initiative for reporting corruption under the supervision of the Governor of the province and in cooperation with the Judicial Council and the University of Saïda.

This initiative falls within the national efforts aimed at strengthening transparency, preventing and combating corruption, and affirming the pivotal role of civil society in promoting the values of integrity and accountability.

Professor Yels Bachir Chaouch, member of the Council of the High Authority, also delivered a presentation on transparency and the prevention and fight against corruption.

The Authority Participates in a Study Day on Nutritional Balance



Mr. Marouane Ben Rahmoun, Head of the Administrative and Financial Investigation Structure for Illicit Enrichment of Public Officials, representing the High Authority for Transparency, Prevention and Fight against Corruption, participated in the study day organized by the Algerian Academy of Sciences and Technologies, in partnership with the Algerian Association of Nutrition, on Monday, December 15, 2025, entitled “For Your Health... Adopt Nutritional Balance,” held at the National Library of Algeria in El Hamma, with broad participation from doctors and specialists in nutrition and public health, representatives of ministerial bodies and national institutions, as well as professors and academic researchers.





Visit of the President of the Jordanian Economic and Social Council to the Headquarters of the High Authority for Transparency

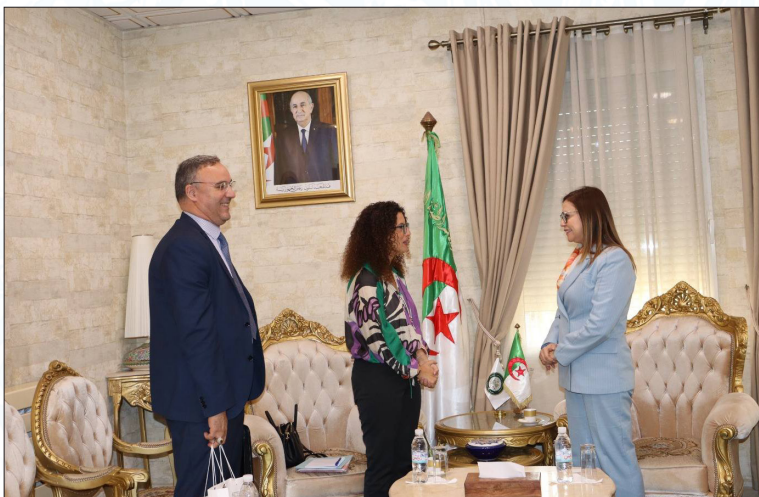
Visit of the President of the Algerian Academy of Sciences and Technologies, Professor Mohamed Hicham Kara, to the High Authority

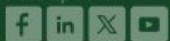
